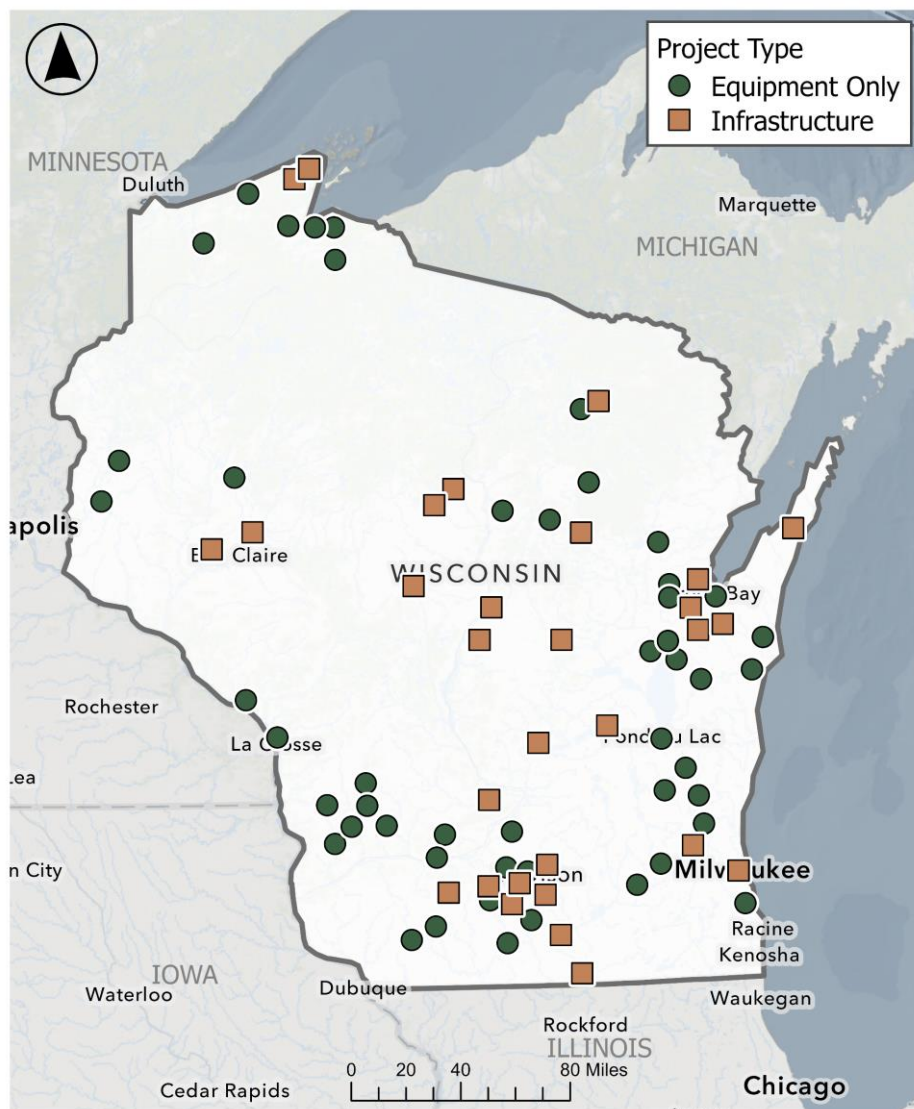

State Overview

USDA awarded the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection **\$28.2 million** through the Resilient Food Systems Infrastructure (RFSI) Program. The objective of RFSI is to expand capacity for aggregation, processing, manufacturing, storing, transporting, wholesaling, and distribution of locally and regionally produced agricultural food products. These federal funds will support 80 Wisconsin infrastructure and equipment projects increasing access to new market opportunities, benefiting local and regional producers and processors.



Project Highlights

- **Expand aggregation capacity** with a new bulk tank, trailer, and vehicle to transport milk from 36 local dairy goat producers to artisan cheese processors.
- **Critical processing and storage equipment for manoomin (wild rice)** to increase processing volumes from 1,500 to 5,000 pounds, benefiting at least 20 producers and Tribal communities near Crandon.
- **Increase processing efficiency and packaging automation** for local grain products such as stone-milled wheat flour and corn for a family-owned mill, increasing access to market outlets including bakeries, restaurants, tortillerias, pasta makers, brewers, and distillers.

RFSI was awarded to the 56 States and Territories in May 2023. Each state conducted a competitive grant review and selection process. States identified their funding priorities through extensive outreach with key industry stakeholders, which guided their selection process to ensure a robust state and local food system representation. Selected projects fund locally and regionally produced food products, including specialty crops, dairy, grains for human consumption, aquaculture, and other food products, excluding meat and poultry.

Infrastructure Projects: Snapshot

Infrastructure Grant projects can involve facility and equipment expansion and upgrades, new construction, and modernized information technology systems.

Wisconsin invested more than **\$23.6 million** across 30 Infrastructure projects benefiting 4,088 local and regional producers. These projects include:

- Constructing a new processing and distribution warehouse to clean, package, and distribute up to 24 million tons of organic ingredients such as black beans, dark red kidney beans, whole wheat, and sunflower kernels each year;
- Building a post-harvest processing facility for native heirloom corn that will benefit more than 60 indigenous corn growers;
- Renovating an existing warehouse with cold storage and specialized produce processing equipment to develop ready-to-use and ready-to-eat products for wholesale markets, benefiting more than 1,900 regional producers; and
- Expanding an incubator farm's program with a new water well, walk-in cooler, and produce washing equipment that will benefit 21 producers.

Equipment Only Projects: Snapshot

Equipment Only projects are intended to purchase special purpose equipment such as cold/dry storage, distribution vehicles, and processing and packaging equipment.

Wisconsin invested more than **\$3.8 million** across 50 Equipment Only projects purchasing more than 227 pieces of aggregation, processing, storage, and distribution equipment—including refrigerated distribution vehicles, forklifts, dehydrators, and juicers. The state expects 1,170 local and regional producers will benefit from reduced harvest loss, improved product quality and shelf life, and access to 543 new markets.

Statewide Standouts



Wisconsin is investing more than \$22 million into projects to develop 70 value-added products, including ready-to-eat frozen produce, sparkling ciders, canned goods, and smoked trout.



More than \$5 million of Wisconsin's RFSI funding supports 11 apple and berry projects across the state, including regional elderberries and aronia berries.



Seven of Wisconsin's projects support a statewide network of tribal producers and processors, reestablishing traditional trade routes and improving access to native foods.



More than \$4 million of Wisconsin's RFSI funding improves the local grain supply chain with infrastructure and equipment to expand processing, storage, and distribution of wheat, rye, and buckwheat for human consumption.
